A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

1 AN ACT TO REWRITE THE AUTHORITY OF THE STATE BANKING
2 COMMISSION TO ASSESS BANKS AND CONSUMER FINANCE LICENSEES
3 FOR THE MAINTENANCE AND OPERATION OF THE OFFICE OF THE
4 COMMISSIONER OF BANKS.
5

6 The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

7 Section 1. G.S. 53-122 reads as rewritten:

8 **"§ 53-122. Fees for examinations and other services, and assessments.**

9 (a) For the purpose of ~~paying the salaries and necessary traveling expenses~~
10 operating and maintaining the office of the Commissioner of Banks, State bank
11 examiners, assistant State bank examiners, clerks, stenographers and other employees of
12 the Commissioner of Banks, banks and consumer finance licensees doing business under
13 the authority of Chapter 53 of the General Statutes shall pay the following fees and
14 assessments shall be paid into the office of the Commissioner of Banks: Banks within 10
15 days after the assessment:

16 (1) ~~Each bank and each branch and each limited service facility of any bank~~
17 ~~which under the laws of the State of North Carolina is subject to~~
18 ~~supervision and examination by the Commissioner of Banks and is~~
19 ~~authorized to do business or is in process of voluntary liquidation, shall,~~
20 ~~within 10 days after the assessment has been made, pay into the office~~

1 of the Commissioner of Banks according to its total resources as shown
2 by its report of condition made to the Commissioner of Banks at the
3 close of business December 31, 1978, and on the thirty first day of
4 December, or the date most nearly approximating same of each year
5 thereafter on which a report of condition is made to the Commissioner
6 of Banks not in excess of the following fees for its annual examination:
7 eighty five dollars (\$85.00) for the first one hundred thousand dollars
8 (\$100,000) of assets or less, twelve dollars (\$12.00) for each one
9 hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) or fraction in excess thereof, and
10 three dollars and fifty cents (\$3.50) for each one hundred thousand
11 dollars (\$100,000) or fraction thereof of trust assets, which said trust
12 assets shall not include real estate carried as such; provided, however,
13 with respect to loan agencies or brokers subject to the provisions of
14 Article 15 of Chapter 53 of the General Statutes, the fee shall be one
15 hundred seventy dollars (\$170.00) for the first one hundred thousand
16 dollars (\$100,000) of assets or less, and twelve dollars (\$12.00) for each
17 one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) or fraction in excess thereof.

18 (2) All examinations made other than those provided for in subdivision (1)
19 hereof shall be deemed special examinations and for such special
20 examination the bank shall pay into the office of the Commissioner of
21 Banks the following fees for each special examination: eighty five
22 dollars (\$85.00) for the first one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) of
23 assets or less, twelve dollars (\$12.00) for each one hundred thousand
24 dollars (\$100,000) or fraction in excess thereof, and three dollars and
25 fifty cents (\$3.50) for each one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) or
26 fraction thereof of trust assets, which said trust assets shall not include
27 real estate carried as such; provided, however, with respect to loan
28 agencies or brokers subject to the provisions of Article 15 of Chapter 53
29 of the General Statutes, the fee shall be one hundred seventy dollars
30 (\$170.00) for the first one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) of assets
31 or less, and twelve dollars (\$12.00) for each one hundred thousand
32 dollars (\$100,000) or fraction in excess thereof. The fees paid for
33 special examination shall be based on the assets of the bank examined
34 as of the date of such examination.

35 (1) Banks. – Each bank shall pay a cumulative assessment based on its
36 total assets, as shown on its report of condition made to the
37 Commissioner of Banks as of December 31 each year or the date most
38 nearly approximating the same, not to exceed the amount determined by
39 applying the following schedule: (i) on the first fifty million dollars
40 (\$50,000,000) of assets, or fraction thereof, six thousand dollars
41 (\$6,000); (ii) on assets over fifty million dollars (\$50,000,000), but not
42 more than two hundred fifty million dollars (\$250,000,000), twelve
43 dollars (\$12.00) per one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000), or

1 fraction thereof; (iii) on assets over two hundred fifty million dollars
2 (\$250,000,000), but not more than five hundred million dollars
3 (\$500,000,000), nine dollars (\$9.00) per one hundred thousand dollars
4 (\$100,000), or fraction thereof; (iv) on assets over five hundred million
5 dollars (\$500,000,000), but not more than one billion dollars
6 (\$1,000,000,000), seven dollars (\$7.00) per one hundred thousand
7 dollars (\$100,000), or fraction thereof; (v) on assets over one billion
8 dollars (\$1,000,000,000), but not more than ten billion dollars
9 (\$10,000,000,000), five dollars (\$5.00) per one hundred thousand
10 dollars (\$100,000), or fraction thereof; and (vi) on assets over ten billion
11 dollars (\$10,000,000,000), three dollars (\$3.00) per one hundred
12 thousand dollars (\$100,000), or fraction thereof. Additionally, each
13 bank shall pay an assessment on trust assets held by it in the amount of
14 one dollar (\$1.00) per one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) of the
15 assets, or fraction thereof; except that banks are not required to pay
16 assessments on real estate held as trust assets.

17 (2) Consumer Finance Licensees. – Each consumer finance licensee shall
18 pay an assessment not to exceed eighteen dollars (\$18.00) per one
19 hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) of assets, or fraction thereof, plus a
20 fee of three hundred dollars (\$300.00) per office; provided, however, a
21 consumer finance licensee shall pay a minimum annual assessment of
22 not less than five hundred dollars (\$500.00). The assessment shall be
23 determined on a consumer finance licensee's total assets as shown on its
24 report of condition made to the Commissioner of Banks as of December
25 31 each year, or the date most nearly approximating the same.

26 (3) Special Assessment. – If the Commissioner of Banks determines that
27 the financial condition or manner of operation of a bank or consumer
28 finance licensee warrants further examination or an increased level of
29 supervision, or in the event of a merger or conversion of a savings
30 institution organized under State or federal law into a bank, or
31 conversion of a federally chartered bank into a State bank, the
32 institutions may be subject to assessment not to exceed the amount
33 determined in accordance with the schedule set forth in subdivision (1)
34 of subsection (a) of this section for banks or subdivision (2) for
35 consumer finance licensees.

36 ~~(3)~~ (b) The Commissioner of Banks-State Banking Commission may by rule set the
37 amount to be collected for processing any application or ~~petition-proceeding~~ required by
38 law to be filed with the Commissioner and for obtaining copies of any ~~publication or~~
39 public record of the Banking Commission.

40 ~~(4)~~ (c) In all civil and criminal cases tried in any of the courts of this State wherein
41 any of the employees of the Commissioner of Banks are used as witnesses, a fee of ~~ten~~
42 dollars (\$10.00) per day-day, to be determined by the presiding judge, and actual expenses
43 incurred shall be allowed such witnesses and the same shall be paid to the Commissioner

1 of Banks by the clerk of the court of the county in which the case is tried and thereafter
2 charged in bill of costs as are other costs incurred in the trial; and in all civil actions tried in
3 any of the courts of this State, wherein any of the employees of the Commissioner of Banks are
4 required as witnesses, the party requiring such employee as witness shall deposit with the
5 Commissioner of Banks when the subpoena is served a sufficient sum to cover the witness fee of
6 ten dollars (\$10.00) per day and expenses, and such sums as may thus be advanced shall
7 thereafter be charged in the bill of costs as other costs are charged. All sums paid under this
8 subdivision shall be paid to the Commissioner of Banks as are fees for examination and used in
9 like manner. matter.

10 (5) (d) ~~The total compensation and necessary traveling expenses of the employees~~
11 office of the Commissioner of Banks shall not in any one year exceed the total fees
12 collected under the provisions of this section, provided such the expenses and
13 ~~compensation may exceed the total fees collected in any year when surplus funds are~~
14 available.

15 (6) (e) In the first half of each calendar year, the State Banking Commission shall
16 review the estimated cost of maintaining the office of the Commissioner of Banks for the
17 next fiscal year. If the estimated fees and assessments provided for under subdivisions (1)
18 ~~and (2) this section~~ shall exceed the estimated cost of maintaining the office of the
19 Commissioner of Banks for the next fiscal year, then the State Banking Commission may
20 reduce by uniform percentage the fees provided for in subdivisions (1) and (2) of this section
21 but not in a percentage greater than fifty percent (50%) nor to an amount which will reduce the
22 amount of the fees to be collected below the estimated cost of maintaining the office of the
23 Commissioner of Banks for the next fiscal year. this section. If the estimated fees and
24 assessments provided for under subdivisions (1) and (2) this section shall be less than the
25 estimated cost of maintaining the office of the Commissioner of Banks for the next fiscal
26 year, then the State Banking Commission may increase by uniform percentage the fees
27 provided for in subdivisions (1) and (2) of this section to an amount which will increase the
28 amount of the fees and assessments to be collected to an amount at least equal to the
29 estimated cost of maintaining the office of the Commissioner of Banks for the next fiscal
30 year. ~~Such fees shall be reduced whenever a surplus exists which exceeds the estimated cost of~~
31 ~~operating the office of the Commissioner of Banks for one year, even if such reduction shall~~
32 ~~result in the collection of a smaller sum than the estimated cost of maintaining the office of the~~
33 ~~Commissioner of Banks for that year. In no event shall any surplus at the end of any fiscal~~
34 ~~year resulting from the collection of fees and assessments pursuant to this section revert~~
35 ~~to the general fund.~~

36 (f) The Commissioner of Banks may collect the assessments provided for in
37 subsection (a) of this section annually or in periodic installments as approved by the State
38 Banking Commission.”

39 Section 2. G.S. 53-184(b) reads as rewritten:

40 "(b) Each licensee shall file annually with the Commissioner of Banks on or before
41 the thirty-first day of March for the 12 months' period ending the preceding December
42 31, reports on forms prescribed by the Commissioner. ~~Such reports~~ Reports shall disclose
43 in detail and under appropriate headings the ~~resources,~~ assets and liabilities of ~~such licensee~~
44 ~~at the beginning and at the end of the period,~~ the licensee, the income, expense, gain, loss,

1 ~~and a reconciliation of surplus or net worth with the balance sheets, the ratios of the profits to the~~
2 ~~assets reported, the monthly average number and amount of loans outstanding and a~~
3 ~~classification of loans made, by size and by security, and such any other information as the~~
4 Commissioner may require. ~~Such reports~~ Reports shall be verified by the oath or
5 affirmation of the owner, manager, president, vice-president, cashier, secretary or
6 treasurer of ~~such~~ the licensee."

7 Section 3. G.S. 53-184(d) is repealed.

8 Section 4. This act becomes effective January 1, 1998, and applies to
9 assessments due for years beginning with 1998.
