# FISCAL IMPACT SUMMARY

Fiscal Research Division (FRD) is unable to estimate the costs associated with the changes in this bill. The bill would likely increase the number of civil filings in district and superior court.

### FISCAL ANALYSIS

Section 1 of this bill amends G.S. 1-17 by extending the statute of limitations for filing a civil action against a defendant for sexual abuse suffered while the plaintiff was under the age of 18. This section allows such a filing until the plaintiff turns 45 years of age. Sections 2 and 3 make conforming changes. Section 4 states that from January 1, 2020 until December 31, 2020, this act revives any civil action for child sexual abuse otherwise time-barred under G.S. 1-52.

The statute of limitations extension put forth in Section 1 and the exemption for otherwise timebarred actions in Section 4 may increase the number of civil actions filed with the courts. However, there is no information available to estimate the effects of these sections, and FRD cannot estimate the costs associated with these changes.

The venue of court is determined by the monetary value in dispute. If any cases arising from the changes in this bill are heard in superior court, the Administrative Office of the Courts (AOC)

estimates an average cost of \$1,759 per case. If any such cases are instead heard in district court, AOC estimates an average cost of \$667 per case.

# **TECHNICAL CONSIDERATIONS**

AOC raises a technical consideration related to Section 1 of the bill. AOC states that it is unclear whether Section 1 intends to limit the statute of limitations extension when the action arises from a criminal offense. AOC states that while Section 1 clearly applies for civil actions that do not arise from a criminal offense, it is unclear whether the section intends to address actions to recover damages that arise from a criminal offense, as stated in G.S. 1-15.1(a).
